**THE SPEAKERSHIP.**

There have probably been large meetings during the past week. The nicely balanced state of parties and the acknowledged importance and interest of the cause, has produced in the community no desire to obtain much information in the proceedings. What has been done in the way of legislation is a problem which a dozen or two will enable us to solve. It is very evident that if all who are to vote, who have done their duty as voters, and as we hope and believe, the wing members, and those who have not been impeached in the present administration, will be present at the election of the speaker.

The *Globe*, Worcester, has an interesting article on the subject, written by Edward Delaney, Rep., and he gives the names of Martin Van Buren and John Quincy Adams as candidates for the president.

—The packet ship *Roxbury* which left New York on the 5th, took out \$100,000 in specie.

—At present, the house of representatives has been organized by the election of John D. Phelan, without opposition.

The following from the *New-Yorker*, a journal of the importance and accuracy of its political statistics, is satisfactory evidence of the little real value given to the statements of the yeomen of the press concerning the conduct of the administration.
