THE NEW YORK papers are filled with the accounts of the religious bigotry of the Catholics in this city. Bishop Hurler has come out in support of the city, which he declares he is neither helping nor hindering, but determined to employ his influence in its behalf.

On the other hand, the ten gentlemen who are nominated both on the pro-Catholic and anti-Catholic tickets, from the first mentioned, published a circular, although couched in such a way as not to mention anything that they were opposed to the views of the Bishop, and were hostile to any interference in the school system. The Bishop, however, insists that he is not a party to the election, and the Pro-Catholic ticket, the Catholic one, claims that a committee have called upon them, and it is stated that they were in the effort that they were in favor of change in the public school system. At all events their names are retained on the ticket.

On the eve of the election, the political aspect was different. There are in the field a regular Catholic ticket, a regular anti-Catholic ticket, and a third ticket composed of the names of the two regular tickets. Candidates for assembly, and three independent candidates. This is the Catholic ticket, and it is supported by the voters of that religious denomination, there is no doubt that the election will result in the choice of two regular tickets and three independent tickets, and three independent tickets.
