THE NORTHERN MAIL arrived on the Light from New York.

A Mr. STEWART's cargo letter has been laid on the table. It is a bill for the relief of the ship "The Phoenix," which was captured by a British frigate on the 1st of February last, and is now in the hands of the British government. The bill is for the purpose of restoring to the vessel and her crew their property, and for the payment of a pension to the crew. The bill is reported by Mr. STEWART, and is to be passed by the Senate.

THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES met on Wednesday morning, June 21, 1843. The session was opened by the reading of a message from the President of the United States, in which he stated that he had received from the Congress of the State of Louisiana a bill for the relief of the ship "The Phoenix," and that he had signed it.
