(From our Sunday morning Edition.) GREAT BATTLE! General Taylor victorious!!!

By the extreme kindness of Captain Eddy, of the hooner Louisiana, who left Brazos St lago on the 11th instant, and arrived at the English Turn this evening, we are indebted for the following important and interesting account from Point Isabel up to the vening of the 9th inst

General Taylor left Point Isabel on the 7th instanrith 2000 men and 250 wagons loaded with stores for the fort opposite Matamoros. On the 8th, while marching, came in sight of the Mexican Army, and when quite near, both armies commenced firing with their artillery. The Mexicans, from 7,000 to 10,000 strong, surrounded General Taylor, but those on the rear were soon forced to retreat. The battle commenced at noon, and a constant roar of cannon was kept up until dark, when all was quiet. Our Army slept on the field in battle array, ready for and expecting another hard day's work; but in the morning, seeing nothing of the Mexicans, General Taylorsen out Captain Duncan's company, and found they had all left the battle field, save their dead and badly wounded, together with three field pieces, which they left on the ground. About 200 were left dead.

Those who were taken prisoners say that our firing was so destructive that the whole Mexican army was ordered to charge upon that of ours, but most of then positively refused. One of the head officers rushed into their midet with sword in hand, to urge them to attle, rather than do which, they shot him down Some of their knapsacks were examined and found o contain nothing but corn and salt. Gen. Taylor tept his post, and sent in his wounded to Point Issbel. It was thought he would not proceed further until a reinforcement, as some places he would have to pass would be very difficult. Our killed and wounded were 62-three officers were wounded, viz: Major Ringold, shot through both legs; Captain Page,

The Colonel Harny, arrived this morning from Point Isabel, which she left on the 13th instant brings the important news of a second engagemen setween the Mexicans and General Taylor, which resulted in the complete overthrow of the Mexican forces on the 8th instant, and his success in clearmg his way to his camp.
