To the Senate:

Henry Maillard, a native of the Island of Guernsey, and a subject of the Queen of Great Britain, was a member of the Legislature in the First District of New Orleans, in the year 1848, and sentenced to four years imprisonment in the State Penitentiary. He was released from the State Penitentiary in 1850, and was granted a pardon by the master of the British ship Charlotte de Louis, for the reasons contained in the annexed document, and he was granted a pardon to the end Henry Maillard.
