IN THE SENATE.

On the 23d inst. John Lee, Mr. Clay presented resolutions of the British Convention of Kentucky in favor of the passage of the Seminole adjustment bill.

Mr. King reported a joint resolution granting a gold medal to the British bark Sarah, for having wrecked American seamen.

The adjustment bill was taken up, and after a brief discussion, by Messrs. Underwood, Foote and Pratt, of the pending amendments, giving the U. S. Supreme Court jurisdiction in the case of the dispute between Texas and New Mexico, the amendment was rejected—yeas 16, nays 24—as follows:
