

REPORT

To the Honorable the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Louisiana. The Board of Bank Managers respectfully report as follows, in relation to the affiirs of the Citizens' Bank of Louisiana: Since the last report submitted by this Board to the Legislature, in January, 1850, the Bauk has regularly met its foreign debt, as it became due, to wit:
