A CONSIDERATE OFFER.

Among the Northern journals which seem occasionally to present a laudable interest in the cause of sectional unity the New York Express is somewhat conspicuous. It is well informed and well edited, a statement of its stand on the subject of Lincoln's services made, and even now it professes to wage war on subjugation upon the South, but advocates hostile demonstrations simply, as it says, to preserve the nationality of the Republic.
