reading of a declaration of

independence, which was

approved by a vote of 100 to

10. The declaration was

signed by the members of

"We, the Confederate States

of America, do hereby

declare our independence

of the United States of

America, and we do hereby

assert our right to be

free and independent

States, at liberty to

make peace or war, to

an army, to enter

into treaties, to

make laws, to

execute justice, to

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
