American States This Day.

At 8 A.M., yesterday, at 10 o'clock, at the Lower hotel, boats, steamers, barges, ships, paddle-boats and sailing-boats, were all in the Mississippi River, between the mouth of the river and the city of New Orleans, except those which had been captured by the rebels.

Paddle-boats were all sent to the side to make room for the steamers, & the latter took up their position at 10 o'clock, A.M., in the Mississippi River, opposite the Custom House, at the mouth of the Mississippi.

It is to be hoped that the rebels will be made to understand that they have no right to blockade the port of New Orleans.

REBELLION.
