THREE NOTATION.

Some weeks ago we heard the prediction that the months of November and December, and probably January, would be signalized by naval and military operations of the Federal forces against southern tributaries in the West. Events seem to be rapidly realizing our anticipation. First there was the great naval expedition prepared at a lavish expense of all the wealth of the country, and now, here, has accomplished nothing beyond the reduction of two small forts, and the temporary occupation of a small portion of the soil of South Carolina. That its attempts at conquest were to be made by naval force, and not by land, was highly improbable, and therefore we may expect news of results on other points of many days, and capable of being captured by an impudent force. Simultaneously with the demonstration of the fleet was the engagement at Belmont—indeed, the first battle of the war, which will be part of a general battle on both sides of the river, but which, from some circumstances, miscarried. The defeat of the enemy on that occasion, we will venture to say, was entirely unexpected by them, but though it is clear that they did not intend to retreat from their recent conquests without attack. Accordingly we are constantly hearing of the tremendous legions of troops pouring into Paducah and Cairo; of the expected march against Columbia; of the excitement there and at Memphis; and of the determined spirit of resistance which this lawless invasion has engendered. Furthermore, the bridge-burning operations in Tennessee, occurring at about the same time, were also intended to be a complete fit to harass, annoy, injure, and, if possible, distract the Confederates at all points.

These events are well calculated to sustain the belief that the South will have to pass through a trying ordeal during the coming winter, and that the Government of the United States will have become perfectly discredited in consequence of its failure to make any permanent impression upon the South. But we see, too, that the nearly uniform success which has attended the Confederates in their various operations, and the constant effort to rally round to augment their prestige in the eyes of foreign powers, and to baffle the moment when England, France and Spain will recognize them as an independent nation. This must be regarded as long and favorable for Lincoln and his associates, who are now in a position to make a bold stand, and to assert their independence.
