### THE LESSONS THEY TEACH.

When Andrew Jackson proclaimed war upon the South, by issuing a proclamation calling for seventy-five thousand volunteers, there appeared to be some measure and moderation in his bold manifesto. In that document he proposed simply to retain the force held by the Confederates, and to make no new demands. It was evident, however, what might be necessary for the attainment of that object. The val of duplicity was skillfully worn, and for a short time it concealed from multitudes the hateful fact towards the South, that the rebels were not to be beaten back and driven from the seats of their deadly enemies. Events, however, rapidly developed the actual purposes of the North, and no sooner did the Federal Congress assemble in the 4th July last, than the mask was almost entirely disclosed, and the true intent of the Federals was made known.

Five hundred millions of dollars were presented and quickly passed, while for the most part the speeches of the members displayed an intense Abolition zeal, and an irre-  
proachable desire to distinguish the struggle by a personal effort, and a general sacrifice.

Federals Moving in Tennessee. New-

Additional Particulars of the War.

Charleston, December 13.—The Mercury of  
the morning says that in the fire of the  
Sunday evening, five hundred soldiers, Cath-  
olic Clergy, the Episcopal Church, on  
Canal street, and the Methodist and Circular  
churches, Mr. Anderson's Hall, Appren-  
tice School, and the Southern Express of the Pa-  
litz, the American Advertiser, Savory's, one
