From Washington and from Richmond.

New York, April 28.—A Washington special to the Times says:—A right of two months has been granted to the rebels to withdraw their forces from the country. Lee has been receiving reinforcements. One thousand rebels have been sent to Richmond. And the rebels expect to receive more, so that an entire army may be sent to Virginia.

The rebels expect to be able to hold out at least a month longer pending which the Convention adjourned.

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
