It can not be imagined that there is a widespread sympathy for the negro in the South. The spirit of rebellion is rampant in the heart of every one of this strange people. Daring it with oceans of blood, and dash beneath immeasurable ruins, it will ill serve up an insinuating guile as the laugher of the gods. The Radical leaders, with the notion of victory everywhere, are only too ready to proclaim their cause, and the influence of Northern duplicity, their implacable hostility to the work of political rehabilitation in the South. Whoever refuses submission to the incomprehensible Radical theory of a repeated rebellion; whoever protests against the Radical idea of subjecting to sectional dominion both the South and the North, and of reducing all political power in the country to the despots of a factional Southern rebel, who has combined with others, in the South or in the North, to oppose the restoration of the Southern State, to the exclusion of all other, is a traitor to a greater number of than Caucasian ancestry, a political felon of the deepest dye known to the code established by the higher law makers.
