Varieties Theatre.

Bourneuil's new comedy, "How She Loves Him," was presented last Monday night, and was received last night, to audiences which tested the capacity of the "Varieties." It was admirably brought out. The characters were well drawn, and the whole cast did their work very creditably.

But, while we gladly give every credit to the management for the manner in which it has been brought out, we must say that "How She Loves Him" did not strike us as being a particularly sprightly comedy. The fact is, it seems, to us, too exaggerated—too much too broad, and in the whole the action had an air of an ordinary drama, with little life and interest, excepted here and there. We have the same eructive, grey, old East Indians, rich as Croesus, who we meet in nine-tenths of our faves'; in Sir Richard English, (Mr. Curran) who, after starting at every body, safely becomes the most good-natured of creatures—Then, we have the same couplet-voiced young girl (Annie Gruber), who loves the same overgrown young man (Dick Martin)—in both of them, after being in trouble with the old "Stamps King," get pardoned at last by him, and marry to his satisfaction, and, in fact, to that very body sise.

Besides this, there is the issue of Tom Vandy (Mr. Floyd) and his wife (Miss Adams). Bourneuil's latest play, "We May," is to open upon the stage, but, however, whether we were not able to see exactly whether the comedy derives its name from the love of Vandy's wife for her husband, or that of Alatane (Mrs. Chapman) for her lover (Mr. Hagan). Both occupy a very prominent part in the play. Both love their sweethearts; both have trouble with them; and both share their love, at the end, in the most appropriate manner.

It is a well-known fact that "How She Loves Him" would fit in with the name of "How She Loves Me."

The conservation is lively and pleasant as, in fact, all of Bourneuil's conservations are. Some of them are very good, especially those in which Diogenes (Mr. Curran) is by way of a philosopher, has about him, the wags, noticing his dialogue, or in his speech of it, the strength and originality of his characters can "How She Loves Him" compare with "London Assurance" or "Old Head and Young Heart" by the same author. In these essentials we hold it to be a failure. However, it is well known that, if nothing else than the formality in which Messrs. Floyd and Vandy acted their parts.

The Reorganization of Labor.

FRENCH LABORERS.

We give, in an article on the 6th last, a general idea of the means employed in the French colonies to induce the Frenchmen to remain in the colony of order, which they had also in view, to keep the slaves in subjection. The revelations of 1848. We will give to-day extracts from the laws and regulations which have been adopted by such happy results for the prosperity of the colonies. Although the legislation was intended to apply especially to the emancipated slaves, it will be remarked that it scarcely avoids making any distinction of race, color, and incidentally effects the same in the colonies, as in the United States, and in the West Indies.

ARRIVAL OF 10,000 FRENCH TROOP TO YERA CATI—CONCERNED WITH THE FOE.

Through the courtesy of a passenger just arrived from Matamoros we have the Commerce of the 20th and 23d September, the Envoy of the 17th, and 22d of the same month, all published in the Envoy of the 23d.

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7. We can, on the present occasion, relate to insurance, and extract the following articles to insure contracts:

4. Labor contracts may be passed before Mayors or before Clerks of the Justices of the Peace.

5. Should there be no agreement to the contrary, the employee shall suffer, for each day's absence or non-service, the loss of the day's pay, and the deduction of a second day's wages for interest, damage, with the bounds of judicial review in case.

6. The master shall fall to pay the expenses of hire by land, either the supplies or the wages of the men, we will pay the expenses of hire by sea, provided that the amount reserved for this purpose is not less than the amount reserved for the payment of the second day's wages for interest, damage, with the bounds of judicial review in case.

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The same fine may be imposed on any workman or workwoman who shall have incurred damages in the course of his or her work, or in the service performed by article 6 of this act. In case of negligence (for the same year) in payment, stop to the payment of the same.

Article 10. In addition to the fees of the Peace, 100 francs per month, relating to the remuneration of employees.

11. Every person, inferior to another, by the law or by the fact, or under a condition, shall be bound to pay the expenses of hire by land, either the supplies or the wages of the men, we will pay the expenses of hire by sea, provided that the amount reserved for this purpose is not less than the amount reserved for the payment of the second day's wages for interest, damage, with the bounds of judicial review in case.

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
