McCardie Case in the Supreme Court.
Washington, March 9.—The Supreme Court of the United States today heard the case of *McCardie* against the *United States*. The case was argued by Mr. Charles Sumner for the plaintiff and by Mr. William H. Hunt for the defendant. The court was divided 5-4 in favor of the plaintiff. The majority opinion was written by Chief Justice Roger Taney. The dissenting opinion was written by Justice Stephen J. Field.
