The Heat Pestilence in New York. The unprecedented hot wave that shriveled up New York and Brooklyn lasted ten days. The deaths from those who had been prostrated by it did not cease for several days after the actual heat in temperature. The heated period extended over five days of each of two weeks.

The scenes at the morgue and at the undertakers all over the city recalled the description of the plague in London. There were not hearse enough to bury the dead, and, horror unspoken, there were not even coffins enough to hold the corpses. There were not grave-diggers enough to hollow out the last resting places of those whom the sun rays had killed.
