

PEARY'S LATEST PLAN.

Explores to Reach the North Pole with Dog Sledges.

Would Establish Supply Stations Along the Route and Place Machine Guns in Charge.

Peary recently laid a plan for a Arctic research before the council of the American Geographical Society. The plan includes the reaching of the north pole. It was heartily endorsed by the council and a subscription toward its accomplishment was opened.

Peary's plan, as now matured, is considered by Arctic explorers one of the most feasible yet advocated. First of all, it is not to be an expedition in the usual sense of the term. It will, besides Lieut. Peary himself, include only one or two white men. If one, he will be a surgeon. The other two, who will be a scientist. The party will be conveyed by a chartered whaler to the point on the western coast of Greenland which Peary has so often made his base of exploration.

All their goods, including dogs and sledges, will be taken with them, and when no further progress can be made north they and Lieut. Peary and his companions will be landed at some port on the west coast of Greenland. The ship will leave a supply of provisions for three or more years and make its way back to civilization before the ice closes in. At this point the most northerly settlement of human beings, so far as is known, upon the globe. They know the explorer and have every confidence in him. From them he will get all the supplies he needs and will with them push along to the northwest coast of Greenland as far as possible, and perhaps into the arctic polar region, it is believed, surround the north pole.

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WHIPPING POST IN MISSOURI.

Used for Refractory Convicts and to Be Sold to the Highest Bidder.

The whipping post, which has been established in the state penitentiary at Jefferson City, Mo., after four years of disuse, had, before now, been in use so long that no one remembers when it was first established. It is a simple one of the pillars of the stairway to the dark cellblock. When a prisoner is to be whipped he is handcuffed and fastened with chains to the pillar, stripped, and the whip is applied that for days he remembers it because of the pain.

Under the present management Deputy Warden Tom Bradbury does the whipping, using a large rawhide, which would make "whirls" on the back of a man. Sometimes there is no flange number of blows, but sometimes the lashes are numbered.

Most of those who are whipped are negroes, for fighting in their cells over gambling contests. Sometimes convicts who refuse to work are punished with lashes instead of the dark cell, which ex-Warden Pace used for such men.

A few days ago a young negro refused to work in the shoe shop, and when his friend tried to force him to do his work he was knocked down. The refractory man was sent to the whipping post at once. When he had been thoroughly punished with the rawhide he announced a change of heart and went back to his task apparently satisfied.

He earned 10 cents for the state. Out of the 1,000 prisoners in the penitentiary, Capt. Tobin said, the wardmaster says less than 400 have ever been punished, and still less have ever stood at the whipping post. Some need to be whipped at intervals and cannot stand good treatment, just as men outside cannot always stand property. "Of course," Capt. Tobin said, "we get a great many hard characters in the penitentiary. We are there for the purpose of taking care of them, and we must adopt such measures as conditions require. That is all that is to the whipping post. It serves a good purpose and is not called into use very often."

HELDED THE BABY FOR BOARD.

Mother Trying to Secure Possession of Her Three-Year-Old Boy. Mrs. Ella O. Werren, of Piedmont, Cal., has appealed to the courts that her baby boy, three years old, may be released from bondage as security for a board bill.

She made the charge before District Attorney Snook that Mr. and Mrs. Charles Werren, of Berkeley, have refused to give her infant, claiming a \$20 balance due on account of the little one's care. The mother declares that she has made a score of futile attempts to recover the child. A writ of habeas corpus was issued by Judge Ogden, directing the child's custodians to produce him.

The infant is Jesse Werren. He was only nine months old when the young mother, next to death with typhoid fever, was compelled to find a place for him. Emanuel Werren, the father, was on a sick bed at the time. Mrs. Werren is his uncle. With Lisette, his wife, he agreed to take the infant and care for him until the parents should be better circumstanced. That was 3 1/2 years ago.

"They became attached to the baby," declared the mother, "and when I went to them they begged to keep him longer. My husband had paid them about \$100 for the care of Jesse, but since they refused to give my child to me they have claimed one dollar a month for 27 months."

INVESTIGATING THE ETHER.

Experiments Being Conducted by Prof. Nicholson. Head Prof. Nicholson, of the University of Chicago, is conducting some novel experiments in light by which he seeks to find out whether the ether, which science presumes fills all space, is moving with the earth or is a stationary matter through which the earth moves. He has built an iron square of four-inch pipe passing across his building and from roof to basement. Through the vacuum in this pipe he passes two rays of light in opposite directions, each being brought back to the same place by means of reflecting mirrors.

MOVE TO GET TALMAGE BACK.

New York Men Plan to Build a Temple for Him There. A movement has been started by a few influential men, mostly of New York, for Rev. Dr. Talmage to return from Washington to that city. United States Marshal Charles M. Stanford, who was a member of the board, said the building of the temple is an accomplished fact. The proposition is to erect one of the greatest edifices for worship on this continent.

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A NEW ANTI-TOXINE.

Serum Secured to Fight the Dread Subotic Plague.

Dr. Alvah H. Doty Visits Egypt and India and Then Develops the Fluid Which Experiment Proves Efficacious. Dr. Alvah H. Doty, health officer of the port of New York, has sent to President Wilson, of the health board, a report as to the experiments recently made with the view of finding an antidote for the bubonic plague. He visited Egypt and India some months ago, and made some study of the plague while in those countries. In his report he says: "During the early part of February a temporary laboratory was constructed on Swinburne island for the purpose of investigating the plague bacillus, and, if possible, producing a plague anti-toxine. Work began February 17 and the laboratory was stocked with animals for the purpose of examination. On February 28 a horse was inoculated with the culture of plague bacillus. This was repeated on March 10. In order to determine how early the serum might have acquired anti-toxic properties, about one pint of blood was drawn from the horse March 16, for experimental purposes, and from this one-half pint of serum was secured. About one cubic centimeter was injected into a white mouse. After 18 hours the mouse was found with a culture of the plague bacillus, which experiments had proved to be fatal to the mice within 24 hours, showing its efficiency. The animals which had been previously injected with serum remained alive. Tests made to ascertain the curative powers of this serum have not been so satisfactory, although in most of the cases it prolonged life, and in one a cure was effected."
