LIVE BATS IN BOOK Pland Confined in & Cavern Deep in the Earth.

A nest of live bats was found 100 feet underground in Snowshoe gulch, metr Cottage Grove, the other day. This is considered a most remarkable discovery and those who have visited the place and seen the animals are at a loss to account for it.

John Dinman and Andrew Wilson have been developing a claim in the gulch by running a tunnel to reach the vein. The tunnel runs obliquely, and a few days ago, when a depth of 150 feet had been reached, the rock began to assume a different condition. The recent sailing of a steamer from Victoria bound for Cocos island to dig up the rich plunder supposed to be buried there has brought out a number of contradictory reports about the authenticity of that treasure legend, the latest being to the effect that it was discovered and carried away early in the '80s. Every time they would get past that spot on the map they would double back on their tracks again, but the island would not appear.

SOME CURIOUS COINS. Rare Specimens in the Richards Col-

lection-Old Campaign Tokens.

A collection of curious coins has been given to the University of Michigan by the relatives of Dr. Abram E. Richards, who died a few years ago in Florence, Italy. The collection is known as the "Richardscollection," and is highly valued, as many of the coins are rare curios. One such is a copper cent, the rim of which is decorated with 13 rings linked together to represent the original colonies. In the center is an inscription: "We Are One." On the other side of the coin is a sun-dial, above which is a shining sun. On one side of the sun is the word "Fugio," and on the other side the date "1787." motto is impudently suggestive:
