AM ANCIENT RESIDENT OF THIS CONTINENT TAKES UP HIS ABODE AT NEW YORK CITY.

Distinguished families who have great pride of ancestry must take off their hats to a new citizen of New York.

This citizen has a strangely foreign name, derived from the Greek, but he is American born. He lived on this continent 1,999,500 years before Columbus discovered America, so that his lineage rather antedates that of the oldest family of which the ancient city of New York boasts.

This new citizen, at once so old, is the Camarasaurus Dinosaur. He is putting up, or is being put up, at the Museum of Natural History. Prof. Henry Fairfield Osborn, of the museum, is his best friend and greatest admirer, but every scientific man in the world would gladly seize the opportunity to visit him and study him. When unscientific people are permitted to see this monster they will stand appalled before the biggest thing on earth.

The Camarasaurus Dinosaur is one of the family of mighty lizards that inhabited the earth during the geological periods.

His tremendous bones were found last July by the field party headed by Dr. Wortman, the osteologist, the student of bones, in Prof. Osborn's department of the Museum of Natural History. In the wilds of Wyoming in a bed of chalky clay of the Jurassic period Dr. Wortman and his diggers found the family burying ground of the Dinosaurs.

ASK FOR IRON GRAVEYARD.

Venezuela Government Wants Water-proof Burying Ground for 20,000 Bodies.

The iron manufacturers of Pennsylvania have been asked through the medium of the national association of manufacturers to submit proposals to the government of Venezuela for an iron graveyard, in which to inter 25,000 bodies. The proposal is novel with iron industries of Pennsylvania, although there are a few iron cemeteries in southern cities. The graveyards, particularly in Caracas, heretofore have been built of stone, but these have proved unsatisfactory, and the Venezuelans have become tired of building graveyards, which have been erected at great expense of marble and granite.
