ANGRY AT BRADLEY MARTINS. New Yorkers Displeased at Their Decision to Reside in England.

So they shook off the dust of the city and sailed for England, announcing that they were going to be British henceforth. They bought Barney Barnato's house in London and a fine estate in Scotland.

Now their former New York home is being dismantled. The furniture, the paintings, the bric-a-brac and statuary are being boxed up to be sent to England. Some time during the coming Inter the house will be sold.

Vt is said Mr. and Mrs. Bradley Marin will come over and attend the sale. They wish to be in at the death and to cast a last fling at the city which did not appreciate them at their worth.

CALIFORNIA SLIGHTED.

Foreign Wine Used to Christen the Battleship Wisconsin, Lately Launched at San Francisco.

The battleship Wisconsin, which has just been launched at the Union iron works at San Francisco, was the first California-built battleship not christened with the native wine of the state. It appears that when a committee of Wisconsin people was selected to make arrangements for the christening the agent of a French wine managed to secure the pledge of the committee to use his company's production in the christening, and Miss Elizabeth Stephenson, who named the battleship, inadvertently gave her promise to use the wine selected by the committee. It is said that several members of the committee are indignant that their names should have been clandestinely secured to an agreement to advertise a foreign wine. Owing to the nature of the transaction and the fact that several of the committee had been taken unawares, and that Miss Stephenson had pledged herself to use the wine selected, the Union iron works' people took no action in the matter, though keenly feeling the slight cast upon California wines in the breaking of a custom connected with the naming of warships built in California-the christening of such vessels with California wines.

Mine Operator's Wife Has a Nocturnal Vision Which Comes True.

They started out last Sunday and found a mountain which was fairly seamed with free gold. Procuring samples of the ore they re-

turned to Van Anda camp. The next day Treat sent out Mendenhail, the coast expert. He pronounced it the biggest discovery of the province. The ore when assayed here went to \$20 a ton. Thousands of tons are in sight. In fact, there is a whole mountain of it.

Annual Income of \$200

Each. The Osage Indians, according to Gen. Pollock's annual report, own over 800 acres of land for each man, woman and child, each receiving an annuity of over \$200. As an illustration, if an Indian and his wife have eight children, the annual cash income of the family is over \$2,000.

"Sweeping for Wrecks" Is an Interesting Process Practiced by New York Bay Anglers.

TO USE TIDES

New York Insurance Adjuster Has Sectred a Patenton a Machine to Harness the Waves,

The latest invention for turning the rise and fall of the tide and the power of the waves to practical use has been patented by William Reed, an insurance adjuster of New York city.

Mr. Reed is the father-in-law of Harry B. Smith, the comic opera librettist, and his son-in-law, he says, has as much faith in his invention as he. He talked freely of his invention.

"I was allowed a patent on my applance by the patent office at Washington on October 18," he said. "By my method the power of the tide in its rise and fall may be utilized at small cost, and by its application the use of coal to manufacture steam and generate electricity will be no longer necessary. "This power can be utilized at any

place where there is a tide. The greater the rise and fall of the tide the greater will be the power secured. A plant by which this power can be secured will cost no more than an ordinary electric plant. There will be no cost to operate and set aside in the Ute act and paying it, as the tide will operate it automatically. No engineer will be required. This power, I think, will come in an unbroken chain."

Therefore, to-day I have greater faith than I ever had in the practical value of his discoveries. During the last few years I have learned that Mr. Keeley prepared a manuscript of more than 2.000 pages, which reveals all the secrets discovered by him.

"That manuscript, I understand, was in the possession of Mr. Keeley, and therefore, while it is almost too early to discuss the future of the work, it seems to me that with the information in the manuscript and the knowledge in the possession of Lancaster Thomas and Charles B. Collier, there need be little doubt but that the work of Mr. Keeley will be carried forward.
