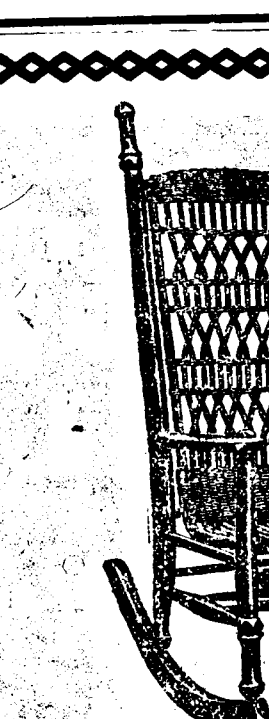

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A CHANGE IN POLICY.

Government Will Send Naval Cadets to American Colleges. The Course in Naval Architecture at Cornell at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology to Be Recognized.

It is now said the government will recognize the course in naval architecture at Cornell and utilize the Massachusetts Institute of Technology by sending eight cadets under instruction at Annapolis to that branch of those institutions.

There was objection on the part of the French and British institutions to receiving any more American students, and when Rear Admiral Hichborn's proposition to recognize the course at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology was not approved.

PRAIRIE DOGS FOR FOOD.

FEARS NO COMETS.

Prof. Colbert Discredits the Dire Predictions of Prof. Falb. The latter positively states that the earth will be destroyed by a heavenly visitor on November 13 next.

"So little is known concerning the orbits of comets that the chances of a collision between any one of them and the earth cannot be calculated. Such a thing is not at all impossible, but no one can say from scientific investigation that it will or will not happen upon any given date."

"Prof. Falb undoubtedly refers to the Temple comet, which will cross the earth's path in November and would strike it but for the fact that this planet will be on the other side of its orbit at that time, some six months' journey away from the danger. I know of no other comet that will be anywhere in the neighborhood of the earth at that time."
