An Open Letter

From Mr. C. Wunder, Publicity Manager of the National Wholesale Liquor Dealers' Association of America.

Hurtful Prohibition in West Virginia.

Cincinnati, O., April 30th, 1915.

Dear Sir—Boys and girls held in county jails throughout the state, who have been sentenced to the state reformatory institutions, are being released because West Virginia has no money in the State Treasury with which to pay transportation, owing to the last legislature's failure to provide sufficient funds with which to pay the state's operating expenses.

So reads a recent dispatch from Charleston, W. Va., telling of conditions in that "dry" state. We especially wish to call these conditions to your attention in anticipation of the use of which these facts will be put to in the future by the leaders and workers of the Anti-Saloon League and the allied forces of that league.

I have no doubt that these facts will soon be garbled, as were the facts in the case of Kansas. The people of the United States will be told that there are fewer persons in the jails, fewer prisoners in the state reformatories, and fewer inmates in the insane asylums in West Virginia, which facts will seem to be an indication of great social and moral advancement in that state.

Another example of the garbling of the prohibition enthusiasts is that of the statement of Gov. Capper, of Kansas, to the effect that

"87 of the 105 counties in Kansas have no insane; 54 have no feeble-minded." etc. When asked about this absurd statement as to insanity and the equally absurd statement as to feeble-mindedness in Kansas, Dr. M. L. Perry, superintendent of the Hospital for Epileptics, at Parsons, Kansas, wrote under date of October 24th, 1914:

"I suppose there is hardly a county in the state that has not its representative in some state institution, and there are certainly many feeble-minded who are not under institution care."

In his report on the State Hospital for Epileptics (page 114), he says: "Notwithstanding the fact that some of the cottages have been considerably

overcrowded, we could not accommodate all who applied for admission, and much to my regret it has recently become necessary to refuse admission to some male patients. This is the first time since the opening of the institution that care and treatment has been denied any epileptic resident of Kansas who has sought state aid."

This crowded condition exists despite the opening of a new state hospital at Larned in 1914, as noted in the Fifth Biennial Report of the Board of Control of the State Charitable Institutions of Kansas.

Moreover despite this overcrowded conditions of Kansas hospitals, there has been a considerable increase in number of insane in public hospitals since the 1910 census.

The following table shows this plainly:

I call your attention to these conditions at this time in the two "dry" states of Kansas and West Virginia, because the West Virginia of today may be held up in the course of a few months as one of the beautiful examples of a prohibition state just as Kansas is now being exhibited as the moral paradise of the Union.
