General Overflow.

Ever since the Sauve crevasse, which may be referred to as a sort of epoch or starting point, there has been an extraordinary pressure of water upon the fluvial parishes of this State. Not only a large portion of the coast along the Mississippi up to the Arkansas line is under water, partially or wholly, but the bayou lands, now become an important part of the productive soil of Louisiana, are more or less submerged. And thus with the interior streams, Red River has exhibited a succession of heavy floods, and the alluvial lands on the Ouachita are completely inundated. The aggregate of the growing crop will be greatly reduced both of cotton and sugar, and the loss on stock, labor, and improvements is beyond calculation. This is the second crop, consecutively, that hundreds have lost from the same cause, which while it exists suspends all action on the plantation thus making capital dead and unproductive, besides the positive damage inflicted. These losses to individuals sink an amount of capital no man can fairly estimate, but which it would be difficult to exaggerate. Exposed as the alluvial region of Louisiana is, from its peculiar structure, to inundation, and having suffered from it, at intervals, ever since the country was first settled, it is surprising how little has been done to guard against the calamity. The Spanish government at an enormous cost — for in those days there were only raw Africans or Acadian French to labor with the spade the stalwart men that now achieve such prodigies, with it not having found their way to Louisiana — erected the levee on the coast contiguous to New Orleans; but not one dollar that we know of has been expended by the United States, immediately or collaterally, for the protection of this delta, contributing as it does so largely to the national commerce by its exports and to the national revenues by the vast consumption of imports.

American Society for Judicial Settlement of International Disputes.

The sixth annual conference of the American Society for Judicial Settlement of International Disputes, will be held in Washington, on December 8 and 9, when the general topic of discussion will be: "The Supreme Court of the United States," with particular references to the analogy between that great tribunal and an International Court of Justice, the establishment of which is the main object of the society.

Honorable William Howard Taft is honorary president of the society, and among its advisory counsel are several well known New Orleanians, including Professor Edwin A. Alderman, formerly of Tulane; Honorable Jacob M. Dickinson, formerly secretary of War; Cardinal James Gibbons, Philander C. Knox, late Secretary of State; Thomas Nelson Page, now Ambassador to Italy, and Justice William R. Riddell, of Toronto, who took a active part in the centennial proceedings in this State last year; Mr. W. O. Hart, who is member of the society, and whose paper, read before the American National Peace Conference in 1914, "Peace Impossible Without an International Code," will be presented at the conference, hopes to be able to attend and take part in the deliberations thereof.
