WOMEN STREET CAR DRIVERS WIN STRIKE

Berlin, April 23.—The street railway service in the city of Magdeburg was tied up for three days recently when the female conductors and "motormen" went on strike. On account of the increased cost of living, the women demanded a raise of forty cents per day, besides a reduction of their working hours. The lines are owned by the municipality. The city authorities at first refused to grant the demands and tried to run the cars with the aid of old men and boys, but the public took the part of the strikers. Fearful serious disorders, the Mayor asked the striking women to send a delegation to his office. The conference ended with a complete victory for the "lady conductors," and within an hour all of them were back on their cars. The pay of the women now is about a third higher than what the male conductors and motormen got before the war.

PROPOSES WILD GAME AS WAR TIME ASSET
