FIGHT OPENS ON SHINGLE ROOF

Passage of ordinances eliminating shingle roofs from the five principal cities of Louisiana outside of New Orleans, which has already forbidden them, will be fought in the near future as the result of a campaign recently inaugurated by W. M. Campbell, state fire marshal, in co-operation with the fire insurance companies.

Five Cities Named
The five cities in which it is sought to do away with the future building of shingle roofs are Baton Rouge, Lake Charles, Monroe, Shreveport and Alexandria.

Hearing Proposed
Before final action is taken on the ordinances a hearing will be given all interested persons July 10.

Mr. Campbell states that he will not attempt anti-shingle campaigns in towns of less than 10,000 population.
