

# THANKFUL FOR WORK OF LADIES

Washington, June 30.—The United States marines who are going to France will think many times of the kindness of American women in adding to their comfort and health by providing them with extra warm garments and comfort outfits, says Major-General George Barnett, commandant of marines, in a letter received today by Mrs. James Carroll Frazer, chairman of the committee of the Navy league.

Every marine in the expeditionary force has been provided with extra woolen clothing knitted by the women of the Navy league. It was necessary to rush this work through so rapidly that Colonel C. A. Doyen, in command of the marine expeditionary regiment, in thanking the league for this service, said that the quickness and efficiency of these volunteer workers seemed to him "little short of a miracle."

Here is Major-General Barnett's letter, which is really addressed to each of the many thousand American women now engaged in this work under the direction of the comforts committee of the Navy league:

"Headquarters U. S. Marine Corps, Commandant's Office, Washington. My Dear Mrs. Frazer: Let me thank you most sincerely for all you have done towards furnishing 2,700 sweaters needed for the marines who are going to France with the first expedition. I

want you to know that not only I, as commandant of the marine corps, but that all of the officers and men of the corps very greatly appreciate your efforts and the efforts of those who assisted you in this great work. I am sure that the men who are going will think many times of your kindness in doing so much work to add to their comfort and health. Through you let me acknowledge my thanks to all who assisted you.

"If it can possibly be done, I wish very much that you would let me have the names and addresses of the different units that were working with you in making sweaters, so that I may at least send my thanks and appreciation to those units.

"I am sure that it will add very much to the efficiency of the men at the front to know that so many kind friends at home are ready and willing to work for their comfort.

# TEN STRAIGHTS THE BEST RECORD

New York, June 30.—Ten straight victories is the best record of consistent winning that has been hung up in either of the big leagues to date. If consistency is the prime factor in grabbing a pennant, Philadelphia, New York and Chicago should be locked in the final struggle in the National, and the White Sox and Red Sox in the American, on the face of records as they stand to-day.

Against the well-known consistency formula, however, is the record of the Braves, who once drove their way to a championship by a sudden upheaval toward the tag end of the season.

The Phillies so far have thrown themselves to one winning streak of ten games. The Cubs have accomplished nine straight, while the Giants' best is six in a row.

The Phillies have an added record of five straight, while the Giants have knocked down this many victories in a row a couple of times. The second best mark for the Cubs is three. The Red Sox came within one game of equaling the Phillies' mark of ten straight, having finished on top in nine straight games on two streaks of winning. The White Sox have done the opposite eight times in a row on two occasions. The Red Sox haven't had much time to accomplish side records, but they have managed to get away with a run of three. The

White Sox also have won four in a row.

Not the Athletics, but the Senators, hold the record for consecutive losses, having amassed a count of ten without a victory. The Athletics' worst run is eight defeats, just one more than Wilbert Robinson's one-time fearsome Dodgers have turned in.

**SAYS CONVICTS WORK TWICE USUAL RATE**

**CORNELL GRADUATION FINDS 600 AT WAR**  
Ithaca, N. Y., June 30.—Six hundred members of the graduation class were found to have left to take an active part in the war when Cornell university's forty-ninth annual commencement was held today.

A total of 2,065 men from all classes have been granted leaves of absence since the declaration of war, or nearly half the number enrolled for the academic year.

The members of the New York State Press association, which opened its annual convention here today, are guests of the university at the commencement exercises and at luncheon. All social affairs in connection with commencement have been omitted this year.

**COMING BUT WON'T BOX**  
New York, June 30.—Georges Carpentier, the famous French army aviator and light heavyweight boxer, will visit America within the next few weeks, according to R. C. Koxin, a boxing promoter, who has just returned from France. Carpentier, however, will not accept any engagements to meet any American boxers while here, but will confine his activities to obtaining recruits for the French flying corps.

**TOWN GETS RED CROSS ALLOTMENT IN ONE DAY**

Pendleton, Ore., June 30.—The little town of Athena is the first community in Oregon to raise its quota of the \$600,000 this state is expected to subscribe for the national Red Cross fund. Although the national drive did not start until June 18, the Athena committee became enthusiastic, and in one day went out and obtained the \$2,500 allotted to the town. Athena has only 800 people, but they took \$50,000 worth of Liberty Loan bonds.

So man has a saloon, but under the law he is not allowed to sell anything to be drunk away from his premises. He broke the law, and thereby forfeits a \$3,000 bond, gives up a \$1,000 license and pays a \$300 fine. He is barred from ever selling liquor again.
