May Play Part In The Great War

Bugardier - General Peyton C. March, artillery officer, was born in Pennsylvania December 27, 1864, and was appointed to the Military Academy from that state in 1887.

General March is recognized as the greatest artillerist in the American army, and as such at the personal request of Major-General Pershing was detailed by the secretary of war as the commanding artillery officer with the first forces to be sent to France.

During the Spanish war he was chosen as the personal friend of the late Colonel John Jacob Astor as instructor for the famous Astor battery, and after muster out of the volunteers returned to the regular service and was sent to the Philippines as aide to General MacArthur.

ONLY EXPLORER IN ARTIC SEAS

By International News Service. Seattle, Wash., July 3.—Viljalmar Stefansson, at the head of the Canadian expedition, is now the only explorer in the arctic seas. It is believed that Stefansson and his twenty-four white men and nine Eskimos already are now heading eastward from Melville Island on board the motor vessel Polar Bear in an attempt to make the Northeast passage from the Pacific to the Atlantic ocean.

Stefansson and his expedition left Victoria, B. C., four years ago in the steam whaler Karluk. At Nome, Alaska, the expedition was divided into northern and southern parties, Stefansson, on the Karluk, taking command of the former, which was to seek new land north of the mouth of the Mackenzie river, and Dr. Rudolph M. Anderson, with two smaller vessels, proceeding toward the Coronation gulf country, east of the Mackenzie delta, to study the blond Eskimos.

The Karluk stopped at Point Barrow, the most northerly point of Alaska, early in September, 1913, and was at once clutched by the ice. On September 10 the ship was apparently frozen in for the winter, and Stefansson, accompanied by two white men and two Eskimos, went ashore to hunt caribou for winter meat.

BRENDA II WINS RACE TO BILOXI

Brenda II won over all comers in yesterday's annual yacht race of the Southern Yacht club between New Orleans and Biloxi. The Oasmanche, the new boat built by Fetterly & Sons, for Captain Albert Aschaffenburg and Dr. A. R. MacDiarmid, was second, 29 minutes and 31 seconds astern of the Brenda II.

The race yesterday was declared a great success notwithstanding that a great number of the high powered boats were out of the race because of war conditions. These conditions made it impossible for the usual race to Pensacola, Fla., and therefore Biloxi was decided upon as the end of the contest.

Stefansson passed the summers of 1915 and 1916 in exploring this new land, and having established communication in 1915 with the Anderson party through the power boat Polar Bear, which had gone to Banksland with supplies, Stefansson purchased the Polar Bear and has since made it his headquarters.
