The Lafayette school board let the contract Monday for the Carenero high school, a two-story brick structure, for \$28,448.

The grand jury at Monroe is considering charges of conspiracy in connection with the Missouri Pacific strike.

Carl Wilder, a mail carrier, was found drowned in Bayou Nezquippe, near Jennings Monday. Death was accidental.

The Marvel Theater at Thibodaux has been purchased by the Grand Theater Co.

Natchitoches reports that great quantities of vegetables and fruit have been canned there this year.

The Jennings Motor Car Co. has let the contract for an \$11,000 garage.

Charles H. Seig, a Chicago capitalist, threatens to sue Nona Mills Co. of Leesville to make them fulfill their alleged contract to sell him all their timber holdings and mill property for \$2,500,000.

A former resident of Ascension parish has presented New Orleans base hospital unit with a motor ambulance.

The committee of rice growers who have returned from Washington are hopeful of government aid in combating salt water.

The State Normal summer school at Natchitoches gave out 600 certificates to attendants last week.

Contractors are getting material on the ground for the buildings at Camp Beauregard confinement.

Aaron Smith, a negro, was dangerously wounded by a spring gun while trying to force his way into Smith's jewelry shop at Lake Charles.

The Onachita Cocoa Bottling Co. at Monroe paid \$10,000 for the old Masonic property this week.

Dan Horton shot and killed Ezra Anderson near Maunfield Monday. He claims self-defense.

The Lake Charles school board has increased Superintendent Yeager's salary to \$3,000 and granted a ten per cent increase to teachers.

LEONARD KNOCKS KILBANE OUT

Philadelphia, July 25. Johnny Kilbane, the featherweight champion of the world, was knocked out by Benny Leonard, the lightweight title holder, in the third round of a six-round bout here tonight. The purse was \$20,000, of which each man receives one-half. The referee counted the large crowd of sport lovers absent, few of whom expected a decisive result from a six-round contest. The fight will make no difference in the standing of the boxers, so far as the championship honors are concerned. Leonard retains the lightweight honors, but can't take Kilbane's title, because he cannot make the featherweight limit. The match dispenses of the gossip that Leonard never met a first class fighter and won the title from Welsh when the latter was practically out. Kilbane is the greatest featherweight of recent years and has outfought every possible opponent in his own division.
