RICE HULLS PROHIBITED IN FOOD PREPARATIONS

No longer can rice hulls be sold in any preparation of food for man or beast. This ruling yesterday was received by the Board of Trade from Commissioner of Agriculture Harry D. Wilson. His letter follows:

"Mr. Dodson and myself have had a conference relative to a fair standard of fibre in rice by-products. We have decided to allow 2-1/2 per cent in polish and 12-1/2 per cent in bran. Since rice hulls or chaff are absolutely useless as food, we are going to prohibit its use in mixed feeds."
