Reappointing Patrick E. Burke, John Ponder and John W. Phillips, whose terms had expired, to membership on the board of control of the Leper Home at Carville, La., Governor Pleasant has named the following new members: Lawrence Fabacher, vice J. T. Bringier, resigned; Achille Landry, vice J. A. Landry, not confirmed; Oscar Richard, Jr., vice R. L. Montagne, not confirmed, and Dr. George H. Jones, vice David Schwartz, resigned.

Governor Pleasant Thursday night issued a proclamation calling upon the people of Louisiana "vigilantly to guard against loss by fire or explosion" as a war measure.
