Local News

Meeting of food administrators of the southern states in New Orleans at an early date has been proposed. John M. Parker, federal food administrator for Louisiana, Monday wrote to Herbert Hoover, asking advice relative to such a meeting.

Plans were set afoot, Monday, for holding a child welfare exhibit in New Orleans the latter part of January. Arrangements were made at a meeting in the Association of Commerce, attended by Charles J. Sibrey, exhibit director of the National Child Welfare association, who came from New York. About 40 persons were present.

New Orleans will share with the ports of the Atlantic in the exportation of grain and other foodstuffs to Europe. M. J. Sanders, president of the Board of Trade made this fact known Tuesday. At the last meeting of the board, Mr. Sanders charged the National Food Administration with discriminating against the City of New Orleans and in favor of the Atlantic ports.

A thief forced the door of the garage of B. H. Fisher, 1122 Jackson avenue, Monday morning before daylight and stole two new Kelly-Springfield tires, with inner tubes and rims, valued at \$150, from the rack on the back of his automobile. One tire bears the number 27863 and the other 273912.
